1. Introduction

4. Conclusions

You may use as many sections / subsections as you need.

Acknowledgements

Collate acknowledgements in a separate section at the end of the article before the references and do not, therefore, include them on the title page, as a footnote to the title or otherwise. List here those individuals who provided help during the research (e.g., providing language help, writing assistance or proof reading the article, etc.).

References

The list of references should be present at the end of the paper. All references mentioned in the Reference List are cited in the text, and vice versa. Any references cited must be given in full. List: references should be arranged first alphabetically and then further sorted chronologically if necessary. More than one reference from the same author(s) in the same year must be identified by the letters 'a', 'b', 'c', etc., placed after the year of publication.
